

This song is proof that a good melody is appreciated in many countries and cultures. Many versions have been sung, recorded and used in different contexts in 20th century America. Most well-known are the versions of Pete Seeger and Joan Baez. Mahalia Jackson has recorded a version, which places more emphasis on the pre-condition of our faith by singing:

"If I believe, deep in my heart, I shall ...".

This seems fitting, as the songs likely origins is the "Sicilian Mariners Hymn" << O Sanctissima >>.

I first heard this song as a 13-year old on a German Disarmament March. I was confused! I hardly understood the English text, but I knew the melody. It was the middle of the summer and we were on a political demonstration — what the heck? You see, another version of this lovely melody is the German Christmas song "Oh du fröhliche, Oh du selige, … ", a bit like 'Jingle bells'.
